Hon. Mr. Murphy, Government House Leader, rose on a point of order and submitted that on Friday last the Member for Restigouche-la-Vallée had been ordered by the Deputy Speaker to withdraw from the Chamber and was not to return until having first apologized to the House.

Mr. Speaker ruled that the order for withdrawal applied to the remainder of that sitting day only and that the Member was not required to apologize unless he wished to return to the House that day.

Ms. Lavoie welcomed to the House Mrs. Marcelle Mersereau, Liberal Member of the Legislative Assembly for Bathurst (1987-2004) and her husband Terry.

The following Bill was introduced and read a first time:

By Hon. Ms. Robichaud,

Bill 44, An Act to Amend the Municipalities Act.

Ms. Dubé gave Notice of Motion 57 that on Thursday, March 27, 2008, she would move the following resolution, seconded by Mr. D. Graham:

That an address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that he cause to be laid upon the table of the House all information, in any format, in the possession of the Government related to advertising purchased to promote the Department of Education's recently announced changes to French immersion.

Mr. C. Landry gave Notice of Motion 58 that on Thursday, March 27, 2008, he would move the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Alward:

That an address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that he cause to be laid upon the table of the House all information, in any format, in the possession of the Government related to advertising purchased to promote the Government's new health plan.

Mr. Volpé gave Notice of Motion 59 that on Thursday, March 27, 2008, he would move the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Fitch:

WHEREAS the Premier and the Liberal Party of New Brunswick campaigned on a promise to not raise any taxes; and

WHEREAS the Liberal Government did raise taxes for individuals and businesses both large and small; and

WHEREAS the Liberal Government has created an economic environment that is uncompetitive and detrimental to the financial stability of the Province by maintaining a taxation rate that is unnecessarily inflated to off-set this Government's poor financial management; and

WHEREAS the Government has failed to decrease small business and personal taxes while maintaining a budget surplus;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Legislative Assembly condemn the Government for failing the people and businesses of New Brunswick by over-taxing and mismanaging the once good financial condition of the Province of New Brunswick.

Mr. Betts gave Notice of Motion 60 that on Thursday, March 27, 2008, he would move the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Holder:

WHEREAS with a recent increase in the price for uranium, much of the area in southeast New Brunswick has been staked in preparation for the mining of uranium; and

WHEREAS the possible health risks to individuals resulting from the mining operations, radioactive tailings, and chemicals used to extract the uranium are substantial; and

WHEREAS the potential for water supplies to become contaminated with uranium, radon gas and chemicals is significant; and

WHEREAS in particular, the Turtle Creek watershed, which is a major source of drinking water for the City of Moncton and surrounding areas, has been staked for prospecting;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Legislative Assembly calls on the Government for an immediate moratorium on uranium exploration in the Moncton area, and that the moratorium remain in force until appropriate and acceptable public hearings have been held, which demonstrate a worthwhile financial benefit to the Province, and that there is no health risk to New Brunswickers. Ms. Dubé gave Notice of Motion 61 that on Thursday, March 27, 2008, she would move the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Northrup:

WHEREAS the Province of New Brunswick is the only officially bilingual province in all of Canada; and

WHEREAS the current government is hampering access to one of the official languages to a majority of our school children until grade 5; and

WHEREAS New Brunswick will become the only province in Canada without an Early French Immersion Program; and

WHEREAS the efficacy of this educational strategy has not been supported by a single study; and

WHEREAS the Early French Immersion Program has proven to be very effective, and is supported by experts, many studies and the experiences of students, parents and teachers;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Legislative Assembly calls upon the Government to reconsider its decision and reestablish French programs, that government commit to making the necessary improvements to the Core and French Immersion programs, and that Government ensures that parents will continue to have the choice to determine which is the right program for their children.

Hon. Mr. Murphy, Government House Leader, announced that it was the intention of government that the House take into consideration Motion 35; following which the House would resolve itself into a Committee of Supply to consider the Supplementary Estimates, Volume II 2007-2008; following which the House would resume the adjourned debate on the motion for second reading of Bill 34.

Pursuant to Notice of Motion 35, Hon. Mr. Murphy, seconded by the Honourable the Premier, moved the following resolution:

Pursuant to Standing Rule 78.1, Mr. Speaker then put the question on the motion deemed to be before the House, that the report be concurred in, and it was resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Speaker advised the House of the occurrence of procedural irregularities during consideration of Motion 35 earlier in the sitting. At the request of Hon. Mr. Murphy, and with the unanimous consent of the House, it was agreed to negate the affirmative vote on Motion 35 and to reconsider the motion following the noon recess.

At 12.30 o'clock p.m., Mr. Speaker left the chair to resume again at 2 o'clock p.m.
