Mr. Williams, Member for Kent South, laid upon the table of the House a petition signed by residents of the province opposed to uranium prospecting and mining in New Brunswick. (Petition 24)

Ms. Dubé, Member for Edmundston—Saint-Basile, laid upon the table of the House a petition signed by students and teachers at elementary and middle schools in Sunny Brae in the Moncton area who disapprove of uranium mines and who are against uranium mining in New Brunswick. (Petition 25)

The following Bill was introduced and read a first time: By Mr. Northrup,

Bill 65, Penobsquis Area Water Trust Fund Act.

Hon. Mr. Murphy, Government House Leader, announced that following Opposition Members' Business, it was the intention of the government that the House resolve itself into a Committee of Supply to consider the estimates of the Department of Natural Resources, the Department of Supply and Services, Regional Development Corporation and the Department of Finance.

Pursuant to Notice of Motion 75, Mr. Steeves moved, seconded by Mr. Betts:

WHEREAS a clean and healthy environment is an important preoccupation and that clean air and clean water are essential to New Brunswickers' well-being; and

WHEREAS the Minister of Natural Resources has stated that there is a "silent majority" that support uranium exploration in New Brunswick; and

WHEREAS thousands of New Brunswickers have expressed their opposition to uranium exploration in this province through letters, e-mails, phone calls and attendance at public meetings; therefore BE IT RESOLVED that this Legislative Assembly call upon the Government to conduct a province-wide referendum on whether or not New Brunswickers want the government to continue allowing the exploration of uranium in the Province of New Brunswick. And the question being put, a debate ensued.

And after some time, due to the unavoidable absence of Mr. Speaker, Mr. Kenny, the Deputy Speaker, took the chair as Acting Speaker. And after some time, Mr. Robichaud rose on a point of order and submitted that Hon. Mr. Albert was using a cellular telephone in the Chamber. Mr. Deputy Speaker ruled the point well taken and reminded all Members that the use of cellular phones in the Chamber is not permitted.

And after some further time, Hon. Mr. Arseneault, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Haché, moved in amendment:

#### AMENDMENT

That Motion 75 be amended by:

Delete the second "Whereas" clause and replace with:

"Whereas the Minister of Natural Resources has stated "we do believe in the process that's in place to protect the health and safety of the people and environment;" and

In the resolution clause, delete all words after "Government" and replace with "to ensure the people of New Brunswick that no uranium mine or other mine development will be allowed to proceed within New Brunswick unless the government is confident that both the environment and our citizens' health will not be compromised."

Mr. Deputy Speaker put the question on the amendment and a debate ensued.

And after some time, Mr. Fraser took the chair as Acting Speaker.

And after some further time, Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

And the debate being ended and the question being put, the amendment was resolved in the affirmative on the following recorded division:
