OPPOSITION MEMBERS' MOTIONS

Debatable Motions

Motion 5 by Mr. Haché, seconded by Mr. Collins to propose the following resolution on Thursday, December 2, 2010:

WHEREAS the new Progressive Conservative government campaigned on a promise to be open and transparent;

WHEREAS the Progressive Conservative Party's campaign platform vowed "responsible management of our public finances";

WHEREAS the Premier publicly stated that his party's campaign platform was his contract with the people of New Brunswick;

WHEREAS the government of New Brunswick has appointed several high-profile Progressive Conservative Party members to high-paying positions with provincial boards, corporations, agencies, and commissions since October 12, 2010;

BE IT RESOLVED that this Legislative Assembly call upon the government to fully disclose the recruitment and hiring process used to appoint members of provincial boards, corporations, agencies, and commissions since October 12, 2010.

Motion 10 by Mr. Kenny, seconded by Mr. Arseneault to propose the following resolution on Thursday, December 9, 2010:

WHEREAS the Point Lepreau refurbishment project is three years behind schedule and \$1 billion over budget;

WHEREAS the refurbishment contract was signed by the former Progressive Conservative government in 2006;

WHEREAS the delays in the refurbishment project require the province of New Brunswick to purchase electricity from other jurisdictions at a cost of approximately \$1 million a day;

WHEREAS the Minister of Energy has stated in this House that his government will accept nothing less than full compensation from the government of Canada for the cost of replacement electricity;

WHEREAS the Prime Minister of Canada has stated publicly that the federal government will only honour its contractual obligations in the refurbishment project;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly call on the government of New Brunswick to demand from the federal government full compensation of the cost of replacement power resulting from the delay in the refurbishment project at Point Lepreau, for the good of all New Brunswickers.

Amendment moved by Hon. Mr. Leonard, seconded by Hon. Mr. P. Robichaud that Motion 10 be amended as follows:

In the first whereas clause insert the words “projected to be” before the words “\$1 billion over budget”;

By replacing the second whereas clause with: “WHEREAS these delays took place under the former Liberal government’s watch;”

In the third whereas clause, by deleting the words “purchase electricity from other jurisdictions at a cost” and replacing them with “incur overall project overrun costs”;

In the fourth whereas clause by replacing the words “cost of replacement electricity” with “project cost overruns”;

By deleting the fifth whereas clause;

By replacing the words “of the cost of replacement power” with “for the project cost overruns” in the resolution clause.

[Debate interrupted due to expiration of time.]

Motion 21 by Mr. Collins, seconded by Mr. Kenny to propose the following resolution on Thursday, December 23, 2010:

WHEREAS according to the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission, the average undergraduate arts tuition cost in New Brunswick has been frozen at \$5,423 for the last four academic years, 2007-08, 2008-09, 2009-10, 2010-11, and

WHEREAS affordable tuition is very important to allow students access to post-secondary education in New Brunswick, and

WHEREAS it is widely acknowledged that an educated work force is vital to the future of New Brunswick;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature urge the government to ensure that a public university education in New Brunswick will continue to be affordable and accessible.

[Debate interrupted due to expiration of time.]

Motion 22 by Mr. Collins, seconded by Mr. Albert to propose the following resolution on Thursday, December 23, 2010:

WHEREAS post secondary education is crucial to the future prosperity of New Brunswick;

AND WHEREAS the previous Liberal government made record investments in our universities and community colleges including funding for both infrastructure and programs;

AND WHEREAS the previous Liberal government brought forward one of the most comprehensive programs in the country to address access to post secondary education and student debt;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly urge the government to continue to demonstrate its commitment to post secondary education to ensure continued access to post secondary education remains a priority.

Motion 38 by Mr. Collins, seconded by Mr. Doucet to propose the following resolution on Thursday, April 14, 2011:

WHEREAS the province's consumer advocate for insurance is warning of an impending crisis in home insurance rates;

WHEREAS home insurance rates are rising at an alarming rate;

WHEREAS damage from climate related events such as flooding are now the number one source of insurance claims;

WHEREAS many of those whose homes suffer damage from climate-related events have not been successful in receiving payment from insurance companies;

WHEREAS the Minister of Justice and Consumer Affairs has informed the House she will be conducting a consultation with insurance companies;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Legislature urge the Minister of Justice and Consumer Affairs to include ALL stakeholders, particularly consumers, in any consultation on insurance.

Amendment moved by Hon. Ms. Blais, Q.C., seconded by Hon. Mr. P. Robichaud that Motion 38 be amended as follows:

In the first whereas clause, replacing all the words following "consumer advocate for insurance" with "has indicated that home insurance continued to show some signs for concern over the past few years";

By deleting the second whereas clause.

[Debate interrupted due to expiration of time.]

Motion 40 by Mr. Boudreau, seconded by Mr. Doucet to propose the following resolution on Thursday, April 14, 2011:

WHEREAS the Agreement of March 25, signed with the federal government regarding the Saint John Harbour Bridge, clearly states in Section 1.2 that “this Agreement does not deal with certain commitments made by Canada and the Province with regard to the forgiveness by Canada of the debt owing to Canada by the SJHBA or its successors or assigns”; and

WHEREAS this section makes it very clear that forgiveness by Canada of the Bridge debt is not part of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS Section 1.2 of the Agreement also states “No prior document, negotiation, provision, undertaking or agreement in relation to the subject of the Agreement has legal effect, unless incorporated by reference into this Agreement”; and

WHEREAS this section makes it clear that any previous discussions or tentative agreements on matters relating to the Saint John Harbour Bridge now have no legal effect unless specifically stated within the Agreement of March 25;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Legislature ask the Government to admit that there is no agreement with the Government of Canada to forgive the debt of the Saint John Harbour Bridge Authority; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Legislature ask the Government to admit that when the Government of New Brunswick took over the Saint John Harbour Bridge, it also took on the debt owed by the Bridge to the Government of Canada.

Motion 44 by Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Boudreau to propose the following resolution on Thursday, April 21, 2011:

WHEREAS during the last election, on a campaign stop in Campbellton, the Premier and the Health Minister promised New Brunswickers the implementation of a catastrophic drug program “within the first year of our mandate,” and the Premier also stated, and I quote, “My word is my contract”;

WHEREAS the cost of catastrophic drugs causes extreme economic hardship to many New Brunswick families;

WHEREAS one-third of New Brunswickers do not currently have access to any type of drug coverage;

WHEREAS New Brunswick remains only one of two Canadian provinces and territories without such coverage;

WHEREAS this government refuses to be up front about the actual implementation date for such a plan;

WHEREAS this government’s target date for implementation continues to change going from “within the first year” to “before 2014” to “early in the mandate”;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Legislature urge the Premier to immediately involve all stakeholders in the process to honour his original campaign commitment of implementing a catastrophic drug plan by September 2011.

Motion 45 by Mr. Bernard LeBlanc, seconded by Mr. Melanson to propose the following resolution on Thursday, April 21, 2011:

WHEREAS the provincial poverty reduction plan, *Overcoming Poverty Together*, was a nonpartisan effort to bring all stakeholders together to address the issue of poverty in New Brunswick;

WHEREAS the conclusions of the poverty reduction roundtable were accepted by the Liberal Party and the Conservative Party in November 2009;

WHEREAS the Conservative government stated in the House that it would implement the recommendations in the plan and respect the timeline;

WHEREAS the vision and dental care program for children in low-income families in New Brunswick was to be introduced by April 1, 2011;

WHEREAS the Conservative government has not respected this date;

BE IT RESOLVED that the House urge the Minister of Social Development to immediately implement the vision and dental care program;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly urge the Minister of Social Development to respect the other dates indicated in *Overcoming Poverty Together: The New Brunswick Economic and Social Inclusion Plan*.

Motion 25 by Mr. Doucet, seconded by Mr. Bertrand LeBlanc to propose the following resolution on Thursday, March 31, 2011:

THAT an address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that he cause to be laid upon the table of the House any and all information in the possession of the government related to ad campaigns launched in and out of New Brunswick by the current Progressive Conservative government since October 12th, 2010, including ads on consultation, including mandates, terms of reference, budgets, lists of firms, principals of firms, contracts awarded to firms, personnel, salaries, ad transcripts, tender processes, lists of tenders and proposals, and a copy of the contracts.

Motion 26 by Mr. Albert, seconded by Mr. D. Landry to propose the following resolution on Thursday, March 31, 2011:

THAT an address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that he cause to be laid upon the table of the House all documentation, including correspondence, however recorded, stored or archived, by electronic means or otherwise, between federal and provincial government departments, agencies and/or persons regarding the Point Lepreau refurbishment.

THAT an address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that he cause to be laid upon the table of the House all correspondence in any form between all employees and elected officials of District 16 School Board, District 16 District Education Council, MLAs, Executive Assistants to the MLAs, the Department of Education, the Department of Supply and Services and the Premier's office since November 1, 2010 that would relate in any way to St. Andrews Elementary School in Miramichi, in relation to any issue that could affect the health and safety of the children, employees or the general public. This information would include, but is not limited to, any notifications, recommendations, cost estimates on repairs, and all other materials related to the issue of mould in St. Andrews Elementary School and in relation to any other issues that could have a similar effect on the people who use that facility.

THAT an address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that he cause to be laid upon the table of the House all documentation, including correspondence, however recorded, stored or archived, by electronic means or otherwise, between provincial government departments, Executive Council office, the Premier's Office, agencies and/or persons and any organizations or individuals taking part in the pre-budget consultation

process regarding the elimination of funding for the New Brunswick Advisory Council on the Status of Women.
